Before You Begin

You must have lived in your county for 12 months prior to filing. If you have not resided in the county for 12 months, you will need to file with the county/state you previously resided in or wait until you've lived in your current county for 12 months. Minors under 18 require parent/guardian consent & must file on behalf of the minor with their consent. You also may qualify for a court fee-waiver Form linked via QR Code on the back. The Name Change Guide was created as part of the 2023 Policy Squad Initiatives. The "Squad" is a team of volunteer activists.

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Name Change Guide



STEP ONE

Name changes are usually handled the Family Division of Circuit Court, but some counties handle this through Probate Court. Locate yours using the OR Code on the back. You can call your local Circuit Court to determine whether your county handles Legal Changes through the Family Division or through Probate Court.

Complete Petition to Change Name (Form PC-51) Form linked via OR Code on the back.

Note: Many transgender individuals qualify for an Ex-Parte Request, which makes the process more confidential and removes the publication requirement. This form is also linked. You must be able to show "good cause," such as your safety is at risk if you had to publish notice of the hearing. (Form PC-51c)

Complete Addendum to Protected Personal **Identifying Information (Form MC-97A)** Form linked via QR Code on the back.

Complete Publication of Notice of Hearing (Form PC 50.) Leave the date & time of the hearing blank. Form linked via QR Code on the back.

Note: Some counties won't have you file this form & instead will make it your responsibility to contact your local paper to have your court date published in the paper prior to your hearing. SKIP THIS IF YOU FILED AN EX-PARTE REQUEST.

Pay a filing fee with the court (can cost between \$180 - \$200 depending on the county). You may gualify for a fee waiver. Form linked via QR Code on back.

STEP TWO


Skip this step if you do not have a criminal record or pending criminal charges. If you have a criminal record or criminal charges pending, you must include a copy of your criminal record with the petition when you file. Contact the Michigan State Police or the court you were charged through for these records. There will likely be a fee for these records.



STEP THREE

The court may grant the name change without a hearing. If you filed an Ex-Parte Request (Form PC-51c), you are exempt from the notice publishing requirement. If you did not file an Ex-Parte Request and the court does not grant a name change without a hearing, you must publish a Notice of Hearing, once scheduled, in your local paper 14 days prior to your hearing. This often costs \$60-\$100 but depends on the publisher.

- For those who completed a Publication of Notice of Hearing (Form PC 50), you can expect to receive a bill from your local paper along with a snippet of what will be run in the paper.
- For those who did not file PC 50, you will need to contact your local paper & provide them a Notice of Hearing on your own. They will then require payment for publication.



STEP FOUR

minutes. The Judge will ask you to state your current legal name, then a couple of questions (typically yes or no answers). Once that is completed, the Judge will make their decision. If approved, they will issue a Name Change Order. Skip this step if you don't have a hearing.

When you appear for your scheduled court

STEP FIVE

If you were born in Michigan & wish to obtain a new birth certificate from the Michigan Vital Records Department showing the new name, you must file an Application to Correct or Change a Michigan Birth Record (Form DCH-0847). The fee to obtain an amended birth certificate is \$50. pavable to the State of Michigan. You are required to send a certified copy of your Court Order along with the completed Form DCH-0847 & fee.
